Studies have shown that students who continue to read during the summer months are better prepared for the upcoming school year and are more likely to succeed academically.

Summer reading not only improves reading skills but also helps to expand vocabulary, increase knowledge, and improve critical thinking. It also provides a great opportunity for individuals to explore their interests and discover new perspectives through literature.

There are many ways to incorporate reading into your summer routine. Whether it's visiting the local library, joining a book club, or simply setting aside time each day to read, there are plenty of options to choose from. While it's important to have your child read books at his or her level, it's also important that your child engages with text that brings joy to them. Therefore, if your child is interested in reading text above his/her level, please find ways to support your child in enjoying this text such as reading it together, reading it to your child or having your child follow along with an audio book while holding a copy of the printed text. If your child is enjoying reading a book below his/her level, allow him/her to do this in addition to a text that may stretch your child as well.

Please consider your child's interests: While it's crucial to choose books within your child's reading level, it's equally important to consider their interests. Find books that align with their hobbies, favorite characters, or preferred genres. When children are engaged with the content, they are more likely to enjoy reading and develop a lifelong love for books.

Visit libraries and bookstores: Take your child to local libraries or bookstores and let them browse the shelves. Encourage them to explore different sections and genres while keeping their reading level in mind.
